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Cross in the Old Testament



LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- To show how Jesus and the Cross are reflected in the Passover of the Old Testament.
- To motivate children to get rid of the 'yeast' in their lives.



SCRIPTURE PORTIONS

Exodus 12; John 6:54-58; 1 Corinthians 5:7



MEMORY VERSE

1 Corinthians 5:7: "Get rid of the old yeast, so that you may be a new batch without yeast—as you really are. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed."



INTRODUCTION

Many people think that Jesus accidentally died on the Cross when things got out of control and the religious leaders had Him killed. But this is wrong thinking!



God planned to sacrifice Jesus so that He

could save us; and He prepared this plan even before the world was created! In fact God launched this salvation plan into action, in the Garden of Eden itself. (You would have studied this in detail at the Primary and Junior Levels.) After launching His plan, the Lord began to place many 'shadows' along the way, all of them pointing towards Jesus who would come one appointed day.

The Shadow of an Object helps us understand what the Real Object looks like.

The First Passover, which took place in Egypt, was like a shadow. This incident pointed towards Jesus, who would Himself become the Passover Lamb one day.


We will study this event in greater detail today.

Final Night in Egypt—the Passover Lamb

In Exodus Chapter 12, the Lord explained to the Israelites what they were to do on the final night in Egypt.

A lamb was chosen.

Exodus 12:3: "Tell the people of Israel that on the tenth day of this month the head of each family must **choose a lamb or a young goat** for his family to eat."

Cross in the Old Testament

The lamb was slaughtered.

Exodus 12:6: "Each family must take care of its animal until the evening of the fourteenth day of the month, **when the animals are to be killed.**"

Blood was applied on door frames.

Exodus 12:7: "Some of **the blood must be put on the two doorposts** and above the door of each house where the animals are to be eaten."

The slaughtered lamb was eaten with Bread without Yeast.

Exodus 12:8: "That night **the animals** are to be roasted and eaten, together with bitter herbs and thin bread made without yeast."

Angel of Death "Passed Over" a after the meal.

Exodus 12:12: "That same night **I will pass through Egypt and kill the first-born son** in every family and the first-born male of all animals."


Bread without Yeast eaten for the next Seven Days.

Exodus 12:15: "For **seven days** you must eat bread made without yeast."

Festival of Unleavened Bread to be celebrated every year.

Exodus 12:17 (NIV): "Celebrate the

Festival of Unleavened Bread, because it was on this very day that I brought your divisions out of Egypt. **Celebrate this day as a lasting ordinance** for the generations to come."





Because of the Lord's command, the Festival of Unleavened Bread was sincerely celebrated every year, right up to the time of Jesus. It's even celebrated today, by Jews all over the world.

The First Passover was a SHADOW

The Shadow of an Object helps us understand what the Real Object looks like.

The First Passover, which took place in Egypt, was like a shadow. This incident pointed towards Jesus, who would Himself become the Passover Lamb one day.

1 Corinthians 5:7 says, "Get rid of the old yeast! Then you will be like fresh bread made without yeast, and that is what you are. Our Passover lamb is Christ, who has already been sacrificed."

This verse connects the Passover Meal and the Festival of Unleavened Bread directly to Jesus Christ.



The REAL OBJECT—Jesus the Passover Lamb

The Festival of Unleavened Bread was celebrated by the Israelites every year, **in the first month of Abib**, also called Month of Nisan.

We see many similarities between the <u>Original Passover Story</u> and the events that took place 1470 years later, at the time of <u>Jesus' Death</u>:

One important fact you should know:

Jewish days start and end at sunset.

The Passover Festival is one of the most important festivals of the Jews today. Yet many of them don't even know the meaning of the ceremony!

Why do you think the Passover bread is broken? What is your answer?

What do you think is the connection between Jesus' broken body and us? How did the breaking of His body help us?

Psaims 38:3-4: "My body hurts all over because of your anger. Even my bones are in pain, and my sins are so heavy that I am crushed."
Deuteronomy 28:65-67: "You will be restless—always longing for home, but never able to return. You will live in constant fear of death. Each morning you will wake up to such terrible sights that you will say, 'I wish it were night!' But at night you will be terrified and say, 'I wish it were day!"
Isaiah 53:3-4: "He was hated and rejected; his life was filled with sorrow and terrible suffering. No one wanted to look at him. We despised him and said, 'He is a nobody!' He suffered and endured great pain for us, but we thought his suffering was punishment from God."



APPLICATION


The Jewish people eat a Passover Lamb each year, even today, not realising that it is just a 'Shadow' of Jesus.

However, 1 Corinthians 5:7 orders us to celebrate the Passover in a different way today:

"Get rid of the old yeast, so that you may be a new batch without yeast—as you really are. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed."

The 'yeast' represents 'sinfulness.' The Bible urges us to get rid of all our sinfulness, and follow the Passover Lamb with holiness.







The Egyptians worshipped snakes, regarding them as symbols of fertility and power.

However, the Israelites saw snakes very differently; they thought of them as the creatures that God had 'cursed.'

So you can imagine their surprise when Moses commanded, "If you look at the bronze snake, your life will be saved." They must have wondered why Moses wanted them to put their trust in a 'cursed' snake!

Today, however, we know why Jesus compared Himself to something so 'cursed' and 'rejected!'

What is our response to what He has done?


- Jesus took the curse for our sins upon Himself, giving us His righteousness instead.
- However, this righteousness becomes ours only if we believe in Him much the same way the Israelites looked at the bronze serpent and were saved.

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

Wisdom of the Cross—Redemption



LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- To show how Jesus took our place, and freed us from the control of sin.
- To teach why Jesus chose to become the Second Adam.
- To motivate children to feed their spirit rather than their flesh.



SCRIPTURE PORTIONS

Romans 5:12, 19; 7:25–8:6; 1 John 3:5-6; Titus 2:13-14 (Jesus—Second Adam)



MEMORY VERSE

Romans 5:19: "For just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so also through the obedience of the one man the many will be made righteous."

How God's Wisdom was Displayed

First Adam

Adam and Eve's sin in the Garden of Eden had far-reaching consequences. Not only did their disobedience harm their own lives, but it messed up things for the rest of their descendants as well. Adam brought sin into this world, causing the entire human race **to** sin and suffer death.

Romans 5:12: "Adam sinned, and that sin brought death into the world. Now everyone has sinned, and so everyone must die."

Second Adam

Jesus Christ chose to become the

Second Adam, so that He could set right the damage caused by the First Adam. On the cross, Jesus **defeated the power of sin and death**, thereby launching a great restoration process.

In this way, God displayed His great wisdom—using the Cross to undo all the damage caused by the First Adam. We will now study this in greater detail.

First Adam vs Second Adam

What the First Adam did TO US

When Adam sinned, "sin entered the world" (Romans 5:12). As a result, we all became infected with a sinful nature.

The Bible clearly teaches that we are born with a sinful nature.





David says in Psalms 51:5, "I have sinned and done wrong since the day I was born."

Because of our sinful nature, the only future available to us is a life of sin followed by punishment in hell. We are unable to live righteous lives because of our sinful nature. And we are unable to earn entry into heaven by being completely holy.

Ecclesiastes 7:20: "No one in this world always does right."

James 2:10: "If you obey every law except one, you are still guilty of breaking them all."

So the First Adam 'gifted' us with:

- A sinful nature that makes us sin.
- And all our sins make us end up in hell, separated from God forever.

What the Second Adam did FOR US

Jesus became what we are, by taking our place. We call this 'Substitution.'

Defeated the power of sin and death

On the Cross, Jesus substituted for us in two ways:

- **First**, He took all our sins upon Himself, and suffered the punishment for them.
- **Second,** He defeated the power of sin and death over our lives.

Power of Sin and Death Broken

When we accept Jesus as Lord and Saviour, He gives us a new nature that desires to obey Him.

2 Corinthians 5:17: "Anyone who belongs to Christ is a new person. The past is forgotten, and everything is new."



Philippians 2:13: "God is working in you to make you willing and able to obey him."

So, the Bible explains that while the First Adam made all of us sinners, the Second Adam is making all of us righteous, by becoming our substitute and taking our place.

Romans 5:19: "Adam disobeyed God and caused many others to be sinners. But Jesus obeyed him and will make many people acceptable to God."




DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1 John 3:5-6: "But you know that he appeared so that he might take away our sins. And in him is no sin. No one who lives in him keeps on sinning. No one who continues to sin has either seen him or known him."

According to these verses, believers DO NOT continue to sin. But we know of Christians who live in habitual sin, <u>unable</u> to give up their sinful habits.

Does this mean such Christians never truly became believers?

If they are true believers, then why are they unable to break out of their habits?





What the Scriptures say

Hebrews 2:14-15: "We are people of flesh and blood. That is why Jesus became one of us. He died to destroy the devil, who had power over death. But he also died to rescue all of us who live each day in fear of dying." According to these verses, why did Jesus become a human being?

Colossians 2:14-15: "God wiped out the charges that were against us for disobeying the Law of Moses. He took them away and nailed them to the cross. There Christ defeated all powers and forces. He let the whole world see them being led away as prisoners when he celebrated his victory."

According to these verses, what was standing against us and condemning us?

Sometimes sickness and disease **is brought directly by the demons**.

We have authority to destroy such satanic works, in the Name of Jesus.

2 Corinthians 4:4: "The god who rules this world has blinded the minds of unbelievers. They cannot see the light, which is the good news about our glorious Christ, who shows what God is like."

Sometimes even after sharing the Gospel, we may fail to see any change.

That person is unable to joyfully accept the Gospel because satan has blinded them.

You can exercise your spiritual authority to bind the demons that are 'blinding' the person.

3. We have Authority over _____ and

Mark 4:39: "Jesus got up and ordered the wind and the waves to be quiet. The wind stopped, and everything was calm."

John 14:12: "I tell you for certain that if you have faith in me, you will do the same things that I am doing. You will do even greater things, now that I am going back to the Father."



It was not God's will for those in the boat to die yet.

So Jesus took charge of the situation and commanded the wind and waves to calm down.

Today, if something is obstructing God's will in your life, you have the authority to cancel it in Jesus' Name.

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

From the Cross to the Throne



LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- To teach that Jesus is now our Mediator and Intercessor.
- To explain why and how Jesus intercedes for us.



SCRIPTURE PORTIONS

Job 9:32-35; 2 Corinthians 5:21, 8:9; 1 Peter 2:24; Galatians 3:13-14; Revelation 12:10; Romans 2:3-11; Isaiah 59:1-2; Psalms 66:18; 1 Peter 3:7, 12 (Jesus Our Mediator and Intercessor)



MEMORY VERSE

Romans 8:34: Who then is the one who condemns? No one. Christ Jesus who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us.



INTRODUCTION

After sacrificing Himself on the cross for us and returning to heaven, Jesus did not forget us. He continues to work on our behalf even today. We will now study in what way Jesus is ministering to us at present.

The Mediator

- The false accusations made Job wish he could stand before God face to face and prove his innocence.
- However, at the same time, he also felt scared at the thought of standing in front of an all-powerful, utterly holy God.

Job realised, "God isn't a mere human like me. I can't put him on trial" (Job 9:32).

This made him wish he had someone who could help ... someone he could send to God to discuss his case—because he lacked the courage to face God by himself.

Job said, "If only there were someone to arbitrate (mediate) between us, to lay his hand upon us both, someone to remove God's rod from me, so that his terror would frighten me no more. Then I would speak up without fear of him, but as it now stands with me, I cannot" (Job 9:33-35).

Such a person is called a 'mediator.' The mediator assists the weak, helpless person by speaking on his behalf.

Jesus Our Mediator

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In New Testament times, Jesus came to the earth to serve as our mediator. He is a Perfect Mediator because He is equal with humans and equal with God.

Jesus is Equal with Humans

Because Jesus became completely human in every way, He is able to understand our difficulties and problems very well.

- On earth Jesus 'experienced' first-hand the deep pain of watching a loved one die.
- His stomach rumbled when there wasn't enough food at home.
- His own brothers used to make fun of Him and call Him a crazy fool.
- And on one occasion, He struggled so hard to overcome temptation that He sweated drops of blood!

Jesus is Equal with God

Jesus is also a perfect mediator for us because He is equal with God! He doesn't need to feel scared about facing God (the way Job did), because He is equal with God!

Jesus Our Intercessor

Jesus is now sitting at the right hand of the Father interceding for us. He wants to give us everything He has, all the riches of glory, through His death.

- He was made sin—so we could be righteous and receive forgiveness (2 Corinthians 5:21).
- He took our sickness—by His stripes we are healed (1 Peter 2:24).
- He became Poor—so that we can be rich (2 Corinthians 8:9).
- He took the curse—so we could receive all His blessings (Galatians 3:13-14).




Romans 2:3-11: "Do you really think God won't punish you, when you behave exactly like the people you accuse? You surely don't think much of God's wonderful goodness or of his patience and willingness to put up with you. Don't you know that the reason God is good to you is because he wants you to turn to him? But you are stubborn and refuse to turn to God. So you are making things even worse for yourselves on that day when he will show how angry he is and will judge the world with fairness.

God will reward each of us for what we have done. He will give eternal life to everyone who has patiently done what is good in the hope of receiving glory, honor, and life that lasts forever. But <u>he will show how angry and furious he can</u> be with every selfish person who rejects the truth and wants to do evil. <u>All who are wicked will be punished with trouble and suffering</u>. It doesn't matter if they are Jews or Gentiles. But all who do right will be rewarded with glory, honor, and peace, whether they are Jews or Gentiles. <u>God doesn't have any favorites!</u>"

What the New Testament Says:





The lavish promises mentioned in Deuteronomy belong to the Old Covenant. Under the New Covenant the Bible guarantees to provide us with even better promises!

Shalom

Isaiah 53:5 (NIV): "But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the <u>punishment that brought us peace</u> was on him, and by his wounds we are healed."

The Hebrew word used for peace is 'shalom'. Shalom signifies wholeness and completeness; it indicates a person who is 'flourishing' in every area of life—physically, emotionally, mentally, financially, socially, etc.

So Jesus didn't take our punishment on the cross, just to earn us a free ticket to heaven. He did so for much more! He died so that we can "flourish abundantly" in every area of our lives.



The Way of the Cross



LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- To teach about the Offense of the Cross.
- To explain that Christ expects us to suffer on behalf of others.



SCRIPTURE PORTIONS

Galatians 5:11; Colossians 1:24-26; Philippians 3:10 (Sharing in Christ's Sufferings)



MEMORY VERSE

Philippians 3:10: "I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death."



INTRODUCTION

Over the last few weeks we have been studying the Cross of Christ in great detail. On the cross, Jesus became our Passover Lamb; His body was broken for us. He became a curse for us so that we can enjoy His blessings. He delivered us from the power of sin, and is interceding for us even today. These are some of the benefits we enjoy because of the Cross.

Today, we will look at what our response and responsibility should be towards this Cross. When the Lord has done so much for us, what can we do for Him in return?

WHAT is the OFFENSE of the CROSS???

Galatians 5:11: "Brothers and sisters, if I am still preaching circumcision, why am I still being persecuted?

In that case the **offense of the cross** has been abolished."







TEACHING CONTENT

Every month, Christians in different parts of India bear the "Offense of the Cross." You and I may not be beaten up as they are, but in our own way, we too are called to bear the "Offense of the Cross."


Suffering for What we Believe

What do we generally believe about the Cross?

- We believe that Jesus is the only way to enter heaven.
- We believe that the love demonstrated on the cross should compel us to share this Good News with everyone.
- We believe that God has not called us to a life of comfort but a life of service, even if it involves suffering.
- We believe that only those who take up their cross and follow Jesus are true disciples—the rest of the Christians are fake.

These are some of the basic beliefs that emerge out of the cross. And if we try to sincerely practice these beliefs, we will definitely end up offending many people—including even many Christians.

Are we willing to bear this "Offense of the Cross" willingly and gladly? If we truly believe in the Cross, then we must be willing to do so.



Fellowship of His Sufferings

Colossians 1:24-26: "Now I rejoice in what was suffered for you, and I fill up in my flesh **what is still lacking in regard to Christ's**

afflictions, for the sake of his body, which is the church. I have become its servant by the commission God gave me to present to you the word of God in its fullness—the mystery that has been kept hidden for ages and generations, but is now disclosed to the saints."

Paul says there's something LACKING in Christ's sufferings. He is going to make up for this lack by suffering for Christ!

This is a shocking statement! What could possibly be lacking in Christ's sufferings for us?

The explanation is simple. Jesus did everything that was needed to redeem us from sin and death; He suffered to the point of death to accomplish this for us.

Now it's our turn to bear the suffering. He expects us to go out and share the Gospel with non-Christians. He expects us to warn people of the dangers of hell. And He expects us to serve the believers in Christ's family with a servant-heart.

Doing these things will involve suffering. Are willing to suffer for Christ in reaching the lost and serving the believers?


